Defensible Space Update: Does your home have Defensible Space? Will your home survive a fire? If a wildfire breaks out, will firefighters be able to save your Dollar Point home? Having defensible space around your home will likely mean the difference between whether firefighters can save your home or not.

The term defensible space refers to the area between a house and an oncoming wildfire where the vegetation has been managed to reduce the wildfire threat and allow firefighters to safely defend the house. In these large events, firefighting resources can become scarce and may not be readily available to protect your home. In the event that firefighters are not available, defensible space improves the likelihood of a home surviving without assistance. You will also be more likely to safely evacuate your home early, knowing that you have played all your cards right to protect your home and property.

Defensible space also protects the forest and adjacent properties from a fire that starts on your property. Home fires are common occurrences and to eradicate these fires, firefighters need a safe place to do their work. And guess what? Defensible space is a safe area where firefighters can effectively work to contain the fire to the important area of origin. Without defensible space and rapid suppression, these fires can expand to an adjacent forest growing out of control and becoming catastrophic.

Plan on doing the bulk of your defensible space efforts in the Spring. This is a great time to deal with all the Winter debris on your property, including dead and downed trees, and when we are busy getting our properties ready for Summer. We also need to be prepared for more work days in the Fall, when pine needles start to fall, fuels are dry, and seasonal changes can produce strong weather events with atypical winds that are typically tied to catastrophic fires. A little clean-up in the Fall pays big dividends when it comes to achieving effective defensible space. At the end of the day, we need to have defensible space at all times. And we must be vigilant, fanatic to be sure.


